

Responding to incidents

BBBA has zero tolerance to 'sports rage' and poor behaviour

Players and supporters expect to enjoy the game in a safe environment without exposure to aggressive or disruptive behaviour. The organisation has codes of conduct which participants are expected to abide by. Breaches of these codes will result in disciplinary action. Coaches, board members and games officials want to stop such behaviour at events, so it is helpful to know who is responsible for responding to incidents.

Incident	Who responds
Reporting inappropriate behaviour	Responsibility of everyone
Behaviour that contravenes the codes of conduct should be reported Behaviour that is dangerous or aggressive should be reported	Report to the Games Official or a Referee.
Approaching the offender	Responsibility of the Games Official
	Only the Games Official should approach the offender - this prevents the situation escalating.
Issuing warnings	Responsibility of the Games Official /
	Coach
	The first time a person breaches a code of conduct, they might be issued with a warning. The person might not be aware that their behaviour is unacceptable and should be notified of the organisation's rules regarding behaviour.
Taking disciplinary action	Responsibility of the BBBA Board
	If the conduct is repeated or of a serious nature the Board will take disciplinary action. This could result in counselling, suspension or expulsion.

Removing people from the field of	Responsibility of the Games Official
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play or venue	The referee should communicate directly and immediately with the Games Official to remove a person from the ground. The organisation/venue operators can request offenders leave the ground, or otherwise can discipline the person for breach of the code of conduct.
Suspending play	Responsibility of the referee
	The referee may suspend play and refuse to restart until appropriate action has been taken. They may request that a person is removed from the sideline and, in serious cases, abandon the game altogether.
Involving the police / Criminal	Responsibility of the Games Official
Behaviour	If a person feels the behaviour of another constitutes a criminal act the police should be notified immediately by the Games Official
Responding to child abuse	Anyone can report an allegation of child abuse
	Report child abuse allegations to a coach, a responsible adult or the nominated child protection officer

In each case an **Incident Report** form is completed
Where an injury has occurred an **Injury Report Form** is completed
Where appropriate **Risk Assessment** form is prepared to manage the risk

Members' behaviour and the potential for discrimination, harassment and child abuse needs to be approached with common sense and good management.
